work to cost \$300,000 more

HARRISON - City Council voted, with council member Lexis Dole nay and Mike Mains absent, to approve \$300,000 to complete the West Road overpass safety improvement project originally expected to be fully funded by the state of Ohio.

During the meeting, several council members explained their votes to approve the unexpected funding appropriation. Mains drafted a letter that was read during the meeting by Dole.

"On a dark and rainy night in September of 2018, a 55-year-old woman was found deceased on the West Road overpass. I don't think anyone that has ever driven over, walked across or ridden their bicycle over would have been surprised that this happened. It is unfortunate that a fatality made everyone in this community gravely aware that the pedestrian access over this bridge was long overdue," wrote Mains. "... In January (2023) it was reported to Jim Leslie, our public works director, that inflation had took the project from \$1 million dollars to \$1.8 million. The state was able to find another \$500,000 in state funding but claimed that they could not honor the 100 percent funding that they had promised, so tonight here we are voting to approve \$300,000 in city funds so that the project can move forward this year. I feel like the state of Ohio broke their promise to the citizens of Harrison.



# Students hunt for life after school at job fair

HARRISON - There's no time like the present to start looking for a job and the beginning of a career.

More than 500 Harrison High School juniors and seniors attended a job fair in the Activity Center on March 8. Approximately 42 businesses had booths with representatives who talked with students about entry level career opportunities.

Most students browsed briefly at some of the booths and then left the center with ideas for the future.

Junior Bobbie Jo Felland, 16, was interested in the Early Learning Center at the University of Cincinnati. Although that program wasn't represented, she talked to Heather Schaefer, director of Shared Living Services, Creative Connections, about the helping professions in general. Felland works at Monk's Kitchen and Angilo's Pizza in Harrison, but wants to look into a career in the helping professions

considering a technician role after attending the University of Cincinnati. She stopped by the booth of Mercy Health and talked with Deanna Bischoff, manager, Talent Acquisition/ Recruitment, Bond Hill headquarters, and Kim Tedesco, professional recruiter, Talent Acquisition, Fairfield Hospital.

of Commerce Executive Director Sara Cullin asked, in 2021, Southwest Local School District to make the career fair open to the public, especially because of the pandemic where businesses struggled to find adult workers. The district agreed.

JamieLyn Johnson started is a special education teacher. developer for the Southwest Local School District. In her role, she has expanded the job fair and worked to include students who might follow a different pathway than college, such as construction, advanced manufacturing or welding.

"We look at what our students need," Johnson said.

She has worked to change the stigma of manufacturing jobs to train students to be leaders in those roles.

After the students walk through the job fair, they may have onsite interviews where the businesses return to talk with them and give them feedback. A few are offered jobs.

Later in the evening, the job fair was open to the public.

According to Johnson, part of the career preparation is resume creation, professional dress, direct feedback and interviewing skills, which help students in their job search.

"Each year we try to do something different," Johnson said. "This year, we offered transportation and childcare service to students who needed it.'

When Pastor Russell Grigsby went to a revival at Asbury University last month he had an inspiration. That revival at the small private Christian school in Wilmore, Kentucky, turned into a national story as the chapel it started in overflowed.

He and the church elders started a revival at his church, Firmly Rooted Ministries, 495 Ludlow St., Greendale, that will run Monday through Friday, from 7-8 p.m., until March 31

About 30 people attended the revival the first few days. On March 7 only a few were there, but Grigsby said the spirit of God was present. His goal is to leave the door open to the community to connect to God, not necessarily focus on the numbers of attendees.

Bill Libbert who has served in several leadership roles at the church including becoming an elder in 2022, spoke at the revival about the need to learn more about God. He was discouraged more people weren't walking in the door but said that spring weather will bring more people into the church.

A native of Dillsboro, Libbert, 80, grew up in the Lutheran Church in that town, but moved to Firmly Rooted, also a Lutheran church, in 1968. He, as others did, did not attend the Asbury revival but watched it via online streaming.

Libbert stood in front of the small crowd and read from Chapter 1 of the book of Genesis, detailing the creation of the world. He shared the analogy of how a building requires a builder and how a painting requires a painter. He concluded that creation

"So many people in our

community say they are Christians," Libbert said.

The revival at Firmly Rooted has brought in both members and non-members of the congregation. Grigsby is hopeful some will become members of the church as well as spread the word of God in the community. He is also training to the elders to make more disciples for the church.

Nancy Watkins, a Greendale resident, is not a member of Firmly Rooted but was there March 7. She saw the event posted on Facebook and attended partially in memory of the loss of her husband as well as wanting a place to hear some music and not be alone. March 7 was the fourth night she attended the revival.

"It was great to get out of the house. I wanted to say something about the journey in Christianity. The fellowship is nice." Watkins said.

Although she said she didn't know anything about the Lutheran religion, she found the experience rewarding

Grigsby said Watkins' struggle was "so profound that she felt it difficult to even pray. She cried out to God for help. A week later she came to one of our 7 p.m. meetings. 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# **Can File on Time**

Spring is noted for the sense of rejuvenation it inspires when temperatures warm up and flowers begin to bloom. But in the United States, the onset of spring is followed shortly thereafter by tax season, which typically generates entirely different feelings than the first sight of spring blooms.

The deadline to file tax returns in the U.S. in 2023 is Tuesday, April 18. With that deadline looming, now is a good time to consider these three basic tax preparation tips, courtesy of the Internal Revenue Service.

**1. Access your IRS account.** Individuals can access or create their IRS account at irs. gov/account. That ensures taxpayers have the latest information about their federal tax account and enables them to see information about their most recently filed return. A visit to irs.gov/account also allows individuals to make payments and apply for payment plans, among other options.

**2. Organize your tax records.** The IRS urges taxpayers to wait to file their returns until they have all of their records, including:

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- For 1099-INT if you were paid interest

- Other income documents and records of digital asset transactions, including convertible virtual currency and cryptocurrency, stablecoins and non-fungible tokens (NFTs)

- Form 1095-A, Health Insurance Marketplace Statement, to reconcile advance payments or claim Premium Tax Credits for 2022 Marketplace coverage

- IRS or other agency letters
- CP01A Notice with your new Identity Protection PIN

**3. Check your Individual Tax Identification Number.** The IRS notes that an ITIN only requires renewal if it has expired and is needed on a federal tax return. An expired ITIN can delay the processing of a return, which in turn can delay tax credits and refunds. Taxpayers filing with the help of a licensed tax professional are urged to contact that individual to inquire about any additional information they may need to file a return on time.

Make such an inquiry well in advance of the deadline to file so you have sufficient time to gather all of the necessary documentation.

"The company uses some guerilla marketing with a waver, although it doesn't consider it an easy job," Stafford said. "This involves person-to-person, face-toface and business-to-business marketing. We do things using non-conventional methods to attract interest and attention."

Linda Goepper is the franchise owner for both Lawrenceburg and Aurora tax offices, along with a Liberty Tax office at 10548 Harrison Ave., Harrison.

Stafford considers Tice, an Aurora native, a champion for Liberty. He started in 2009 and has served as a waver ever since. He even posts advertisements about Liberty's tax advisers on his Facebook page. Those posts, along with those on Liberty Tax's Facebook page, attract customers and even potential employees. Stafford said Liberty Tax wants to increase its client base, currently in the 3,000 to 5,000 range.

# Cincy State receives grant for Harrison's aviation program

Cincinnati State Technical and Community College was one of 11 schools nationwide to be awarded a grant by the Federal Aviation Administration to expand the college's Aviation Maintenance Technology program, which is headquartered at the college's campus in Harrison.

The college will use the \$423,000 grant to purchase state-of-the-art training equipment, expand its new aviation maintenance training program for area high school students, and expand marketing and outreach efforts for the program.

"We are grateful to the FAA for this grant and the confidence it shows in the quality of our Aviation Maintenance Program," said Monica Posey, president of Cincinnati State. "This grant will benefit students and employers throughout our region."

The demand for FAA certified aviation maintenance technicians is soaring in Greater Cincinnati, mainly due to the expansive growth in the air cargo industry near the Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport, where Amazon is completing a \$1.5 billion air cargo hub and where DHL and others operate major distribution facilities.

Cincinnati State's aviation maintenance technology program has 160 students enrolled in associate degree and certificate programs in airframe, powerplant, and avionics.

Graduates in this field can expect starting wages of \$25 to \$30 per hour according to labor market data, and with overtime can see incomes of up to \$100,000 per year.

One of the strengths of the Cincinnati State AMT program is its emphasis on hands-on and experiential learning that begins with lab courses and continues with cooperative education assignments with employers.

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

North Dearborn Pantry's Operations Manager Melanie Marshall said the delivery was the largest single donation in the history of the non-profit that began in 2006.

"This one is right off the scale. It is off the scale for any donation we have ever gotten," said Marshall.

On the rare occasion that the pantry finds its coffers full, excess items are quickly donated to other pantries for distribution.

"Every time I think 'ahh, I should hoard this' and I give it away, I get blessed tenfold. It just works that way," she said.

Along with food and essential household items like soap and laundry detergent, the pantry offers clothing and other items donated from businesses, organizations and volunteers. Area students also volunteer at the pantry and organize food drives to bolster supplies.

"This whole community is just so supportive, and everyone rallies behind that; they want to help. They want to get you over that bump. # **The Conditions**

Below are just some of the conditions that non-surgical spinal decompression is believed to help. Consult with your chiropractor to learn if it can help your pain.

## **Herniated Discs**

This is the most common spinal condition treated with decompression treatment. When the spine compresses it can cause disc herniations to expand, putting pressure on surrounding spinal nerve roots. Spinal decompression gently pulls the vertebral joints apart.

Harrison's 2021-2022 girls wrestling team is no longer the only team state champion in school history. It has been joined by the 2022-2023 team.


The Wildcats, with eight wrestlers in the 14 weight classes and two individual state champions, scored 97 points in the first Ohio High School Athletic Association state-sanctioned girls wrestling tournament at Schottenstein Center in Columbus.

Dearwester's four matches lasted 5 minutes, 25 seconds, or less than one regulation match (six minutes).

# Parris wins long-awaited Big Ten championship

ANN ARBOR, Mich. -Lawrenceburg's Mason Parris, undefeated fifth-year senior heavyweight wrestlers at the University of Michigan, did the Wolverines proud by winning the Big Ten Conference championship Sunday night on the home mat.

Now 28-0 in his final season at UM and the No. 1-ranked heavyweight in the nation, the former 3-time Indiana high school state champion at LHS (206-1) overcame back-toback Big Ten runner-up finishes in 2020 and 2021, and an injury-wracked 2022 campaign, decisioning Penn State's Greg Kerkvliet 5-3 for his first conference title.

Ranked No. 2 in both the nation and the Big Ten, Kerkvliet was a familiar foe to Parris, having defeated him via 18-2 major decision in the 2022 conference tournament's thirdplace match. The 2017 LHS graduate had missed more than half of last season with a herniated disk.

Parris used last summer to condition, returning himself to the form that earned a Junior World Championship following his NCAA-qualifying freshman year at UM in 2019 and an NCAA runner-up finish in 2021.

Or maybe even better.

"There's been a lot of developments this year," Parris told The Michigan Daily. "A lot of my training has been about getting my confidence back from my injury last year and working my butt off. I think I'm the best version of myself right now. But there's a lot more to do.'

The lone Wolverine wrestler to advance to the Big Ten championship round Sunday, Parris attacked Kerkvliet with a fireman's carry 45 seconds into the first period.

Piling up more than a minute of riding time, he worked Kerkvliet down to 56 seconds before getting a crucial third period escape.

After drawing his second

stall warning late in the third period, losing a penalty point unbeknownst to Parris, he thought he had won - the match went to overtime.

"I had no idea I had that stall called," Parris said. "I thought the match had ended. Then I looked at the clock and it was 3-3. I just had to take a deep breath and gather myself. It was what it was.'

Boosted by the roars of the Michigan home crowd in the extra period, Parris dodged a Kerkvliet shot and answered with his own title-winning takedown to become the Wolverines' first Big Ten heavyweight champion since Airron Richardson (1998).

Erupting from the mat, Mason immediately pointed to parents Mark and Shay Parris in the stands, who were shown displaying a mix of cheers and tears on the Big Ten Network live telecast.

At the Big Ten Championship in 2020, Parris finished second to No. 1 Gable Stevenson of Minnesota.

In 2021, Parris was run-

ner-up to Stevenson again in the conference final. During the NCAA Championships just 2 weeks later, Parris once again earned second place to Stevenson.


Stevenson, of course, went on to win the gold medal at the COVID-19 delayed Tokyo Olympics later that year, then turned professional with the WWE.

"I don't want to fall short anymore," Parris told the UM newspaper. "It's my time to get that national title and I'm going to do everything possible to do it."

Defending Big Ten champion Michigan, coached by Sean Bormet, finished fifth in the conference tournament Sunday.

Two UM wrestlers, 157pound redshirt senior Will Lewan and 184-pound graduate student Matt Finesilver, took third place, while 4 others earned a podium spot.

Seven Wolverines, including Lawrenceburg's Parris, earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament in Tulsa next week

# **Coach welcomes smooth transition on Harrison diamond**

He recognizes most names and faces, and also the "elephant on the field.'

Harrison High School's new varsity baseball coach is as familiar with the program as someone coming from the outside could be, and to this point, he is impressed with what he's seen.

Benjamin Toerner has coached on the Wildcats' home field - for four seasons as the head man, and 10 years total, at Southwest Ohio Conference rival Ross. In 2019, the Rams advanced to the Division II regional finals, losing to Chaminade-Julienne. Last season, Ross won two of three from the Wildcats and finished 15-10 overall; 11-4 and in second place in the SWOC. His coaching contract was severed at the end of last summer.

The 2011 Ross graduate attended the University of Cincinnati, playing one year of club baseball. He still works in the Ross district, as a paraprofessional at the intermediate school.

Despite the somewhat unusual and very tense circumstances under which he was hired – former head coach Shawn Sowders was informed in mid-January that he would not be offered a contract - Toerner said the first weeks of practice have gone well (he was officially hired Feb. 16).

"Everything here has been great, from what I've been around," he said after a practice March 6. "The support systems around are fantastic, the kids have been great. I haven't had any issues. I know it's a unique situation, but everything I've been around has been handled great."

He also expressed admiration for Sowders.

"I respect the hell out of Shawn. He's a fantastic

coach and he's done a great job around here."

The program is now his, so what should Harrison fans expect?

"I've asked the kids already for two things. Be professional and be aggressive. If we can handle those two things, that's what you should expect to see, a team that is professional, aggressive."

The professional part showed itself when Toerner first met with players. He described it as a "very positive vibe from all of the kids.

"I thought that was very mature this group. And ever since then, you know, whenever I asked anything of them, it's kind of been the same way. It's been a very energetic, 'Yeah, Let's try that. Let's move forward.""

Pitching, depth and athleticism will be the team strengths, Toerner said; the athleticism will give the Wildcats some defensive versatility. He also praised the senior class for its leadership.

The lineup itself is not settled; answers will begin

to come into focus Thursday, when Harrison is scheduled to play a scrimmage at Elder (weather permitting).

"We have a loose idea of who is going to be where, but as far as a depth chart goes for those positions, it's still very much up in the air," Toerner said.

Juniors Anthony and Nick Sedam are three-year varsity players who will see prominent roles this season. Anthony Sedam hit .328 920-for-61) in 2022, with 16 runs batted in and 10 runs scored. Nick Sedam hit .338 (23-for-68) with three doubles, a triple, 16 RBI and 16 runs scored. Both will play in the field as well as pitch.

'They're guys whose names I've seen on lineup cards for years now. I can already tell they're bigger, stronger than they have been," Toerner said. "They've put up some numbers already that been impressive. Just the things they do on the field are really impressive,"

Another junior, Kelyn Dallio, is also in the pitch-

ing mix. He appeared in 10 games last season with a 3-3 record and 2.37 earned run average with 50 strikeouts in 38.1 innings. Juniors Joe Banks, Elliott Flowers, Alan Roessler, Lukas Hudler and Owen Sickinger and sophomore Seth Green are also in the pitching mix. Of those, Banks has the most varsity experience, going 3-3 with a 2.455 ERA, 27 strikeouts and one shutout in 11 games (25.2 innings.)

"I don't think we've thrown a pitcher on the mound yet that I haven't gone, 'Wow!'" Toerner said.

Harrison will play four scrimmages. After Elder, they go to Hamilton Saturday, March 18, host St. Xavier Tuesday, March 21, and play at Oak Hills Wednesday, March 22. The first regular-season game is Wednesday, March 29, at home vs. Conner. This season, SWOC teams will play three-game series against each other - on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, alternating home field. Harrison's first SWOC game is Monday, April 3, at home vs. Edgewood.

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# EC's Wolf family enters Indiana Wrestling Hall

INDIANAPOLIS - Indiana's high school wrestling coaches officially recognized what Dearborn County has known for most of 5 decades now on Sunday, Feb. 19.

The Wolf family - East Central's No. 1 clan on the mat dating back to the early 1990s - was accorded the rare honor as recipient of the Indiana High School Wrestling Coaches Association's Historians Special Family Award.

Nominated - and introduced by former EC head coach Scott Schwarz, an Indiana Hall of Famer himself, the Bright area clan was honored at that organization's Hall of Fame banquet, held annually on the day after the IHSAA State Finals.

Bill and Jill Wolf's boys all former Trojan standouts, including current EC head coach Adam and former Indiana University athletes Andrew and Arik - essentially have formed the center of East Central's successful and long-running mat universe. Along with the current generation of Wolf matmen, of course.

It all started with Wolf family patriarch Bill, an active member of the grass roots Trojan Wrestling Club for nigh on 40 years. He helped organize the youth wrestling club itself, working with the budding young EC grapplers, helping host countless youth and high school events - up to and including helping provide team meals on event days.

"We all started working on together about the time the boys started wrestling AAU and ISWA," said Schwarz.

East Central matriarch Jill Wolf, the mother of three wrestling sons and grandmother of two who just completed their Trojan careers, also has stood by matside since Adam, Andrew and Arik were little tykes

in singlets. While rooting for the Trojans from the stands for years now, she continues to show her support by helping organize team breakfasts and team meals and helping out with meets and tournaments when needed.

Bill and Jill Wolf still live in the same house on State Line Road in Bright where they raised their 3 wrestling boys. Bill also still works with Adam and his sons in the family business, Wolf & Sons Contracting, LLC.

East Central's three original Wolf brothers all have compiled lists of wrestling credentials longer than the distance from Bright to the St. Leon campus.

Adam, a 1997 ECHS graduate, posted a 23-9 career record for the Trojans before going on to become head of Trojan Youth Wrestling, which annually supports 70 to 100 aspiring youngsters.

While organizing and hosting youth tournaments at EC, Adam coordinated camps and fundraising efforts before joining the high school coaching staff as an assistant from 2013-18.

Posting a 108-10 record since over as head coach in 2018, Adam Wolf has earned Class 4A Coach of the Year honors and is a 2-time Regional Coach of the Year award winner.

He's coached the Trojans to 4 team and 26 individual Eastern Indiana Athletic Con-

ference championships, with 25 individual and 4 team sectional titles and 17 individual and 4 team regional crowns.

Under Adam's watch, EC has registered 39 semistate qualifiers, 13 place finishers and 3 semistate champions. Trojans advanced from the 22nd team finisher in the state semifinals to a record third-place finish in 2022

A total of 13 Trojan wrestlers have qualified for state in Adam Wolf's 4 seasons as head coach, with 5 place finishers - led by 170-pound state champ Bryer Hall (now at Ohio State) in 2021 and 145-pound runner-up Rider Searcy a year ago. After finishing 62nd as a team in the 2019 finals, EC climbed to 12th in 2021 and 11th in 2022.

East Central won the IHSWCA Team State Duals Class 3A championship in 2021 and finished third in 3A in 2022

Andrew Wolf, still one of the most accomplished wrestlers in EC history, graduated in 1999 with a career 166-15 record. A sectional, regional and semistate champion all 4 years, as well as Academic All-Stater, Andrew was a 2-time state qualifier who

finished third as a junior. Upon graduation, he was

the Trojans' career leader in no less then 8 categories: first takedowns (153), takedowns (394), near-fall points (482), pins (103), team points (1,017), points scored (1,351), matches (180) and wins.

Andrew also was an EC football standout, the state's leading rusher at running back for a 1998 Trojan team that went 12-2, losing 14-13 to state champion Cathedral in the semistate playoffs.

With numerous ISWA state titles and Team Indiana berths under his belt, Andrew Wolf moved on to IU, where he became an NCAA Tournament qualifier and the Hoosiers' team captain his senior year.

As a collegian, Andrew also was an FILA Junior and University Freestyle All-American.

Graduating with a bachelor's degree in secondary education, he embarked on his coaching career as an assistant at Mount Union University (2008-09) and Kent State (2009-12).

Andrew Wolf has served as a teacher and assistant wrestling coach at Maple Heights High School, near Cleveland, for the past 12 years. He and wife Dana are the parents of 3 boys -Phoenix, Roman and Reid.

Arik Wolf (ECHS class of 2004) was both a wrestler and football defensive end at Indiana University who went on to coach college football for 12 seasons at Allegheny College and Gannon University, both in Pennsylvania.

With an EC wrestling career mark of 132-15 (89.7 %), Arik was a 4-time conference, sectional, regional and semistate champion whose top state finish was runner-up at 195 pounds.

On graduation his career numbers included 118 first takedowns, 301 takedowns, 240 near-fall points, 80 pins, 132 wins, 888 team points, 942 points scored and 147 matches.

Attending IU on a wrestling scholarship, Arik Wolf competed for one season but ended up playing 4 years for the football Hoosiers. His gridiron coaching career started as an assistant back at East Central.

Arik lives in Erie, Pa., and now teaches at Conneaut Lake Middle School. He and wife Brittney have 3 girls - Reese, Carter and Charlee

The Wolf family tree's

branches extend even deeper into East Central wrestling.

Adam's wife Lisa has served above and beyond the call of duty as team den mother, public relations specialist and allaround booster. Adam and Lisa and the boys reside on County Line Road in St. Peters.

Son Ben Wolf, a 2021 graduate, joined the EC coaching staff this season, while son Blake, won his fourth EIAC championship, a sectional title and was ranked No. 7 in the state at 126 pounds as a senior this year.

"The Wolf family has gone above and beyond for the wrestling program at East Central High School for 30-plus years," Schwarz added at the Hall of Fame banquet.

"Generations of the Wolf family have been part of not only East Central Wrestling, but Indiana Wrestling. Aunts, uncles, cousins and grandparents all have been part of the Wolf family commitment to wrestling, and all East Central sports. They are recognized around the state for their commitment and support of wrestling.

"Their commitment to East Central wrestling stretches from the youth program all the way through to high school. They continue to add to the wrestling legacy and tradition at East Central High School.

"They continue to be mentors to those who have passed through the program. They have always been humble and helped to shape the lives of many. Adam likes to refer to the program as the East Central Wrestling Family. The Wolf Family has turned East Central into an extended family. What a great way to honor the Wolf family by the IHSWCA honoring them as the Family of the Year.

"East Central athletics have been very blessed by their commitment and dedication over the years. And we look forward to seeing them around for many years to come."

ST. LEON - East Central girls track and field is looking at another potential big season, if last weekend's early-bird EC Indoor Invitational is any indication.

EC's Lady Trojans broke 3 meet records, all 3 of in which freshman distance standout Callie Bentley played a part.

East Central's 4 X 800-meter relay opened the unscored, multi-team event, held annually on the first Saturday in March at the EC fieldhouse, with the team of Bentley, senior Ashtyn Gindling, sophomore Addy Brewer and senior Rachel Campbell winning in a record 10:22.78.

The Trojan distance foursome surpassed the previous meet record of 10:28.79, set on March 7, 2009, by host East Central.

Bentley, the 29th individual finisher in last fall's IHSAA cross country state finals, following by breaking the individual 800-meter run meet mark with her winning time of 2:28.66.

She surpassed the 2008 Invite record of 2:30.80 set by 2-time state 800 meter champion Kathy Klump, of South Dearborn.

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

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
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
