Academics

Our district's academic program provides opportunities for all students to reach their full potential.

- Nearly 200 academic, athletic, and military scholarships were awarded to members of the class of 2019 totaling \$1,000,000.
- Wm. Henry Harrison High School was named by Newsweek Magazine as one of America's Top Public High Schools for 2015, 2016 and 2017.
- 327 students enrolled in Advanced Placement Courses in 2018-19 (a 55% increase in AP Participation since 2014).
- Unique Pipelines Program with specialized course tracks available for college and career readiness in S.T.R.E.A.M. (science, technology, robotics, arts, mathematics), business, medical and health professions, human services (law, education, public safety, social work, military, cosmetology, etc.), arts/design, and manufacturing/ construction


Arts

Southwest Local students are excellent citizens. Projects such as building lending library boxes, painting playground equipment, sanding and painting picnic areas and benches, and landscaping were just some of the many service projects accomplished across the community. In addition, the school and community worked together with the Harrison Mayor's Fund Canned Food Drive and our local churches to organize and distribute over 25,000 non-perishable food items, plus turkeys from JTM, warm winter clothing, and Christmas gifts to needy families from across our community.

Social Growth:



We strive for 100% extracurricular participation from our student body and monitor this throughout the school year. Socially we have had several highlights throughout the 2018-19 school year. We began our year with our student-led acceptance week, which focused on accepting **all**

students. This week was so successful that we were selected by Channel 9 as a "School of The Week" and received \$1000, which was accepted by our special Education Department. The high school also was involved in the community-wide Day of Service, with over 300 students participating, and the Harrison Mayor's Fund Canned Food Drive. These events above couldn't have happened without strong leadership from both individual students and leadership organizations, such as Student Council. Athletics, National Honor Society and Key Club, just to name a few. Our student leadership is also modeled in our many academic pathways, such as Business (DECA), Health Sciences (HOSA) and Engineering (Robotics). We look forward to watching each of these



organizations compete each year on the local, state and National level. Whether inside or outside the classroom, our goal remains to develop lifelong learners who have the ability to give back to their community.







Athletics:


In the 2018-19 school year, there were 464 total High School athletes, representing nearly 45% of the total school population. Harrison High School has led the Southwest Ohio Conference in the highest number of students-athletes taking their athletic talents to the collegiate level with 83 college-bound athletes over the last four years. Additionally, 20 of the Top 25 graduating seniors from 2019 were student-athletes. Our athletic department is proud to say that our high school athletes have maintained a 3.5 GPA as an athletic department, earning a ranking of ALL-ACADEMIC for the Southwest Ohio Conference!

















Harrison Junior School

Academic Growth:

Harrison Junior School has made great strides in creating unique opportunities that allow Middle School students the option of earning high school credits within their Junior School years. During the 2018-19 school year, Harrison Junior School students earned high school credits in Algebra 1, Geometry, Health, Spanish 1, Spanish 2, French 1, French 2, and Biology. This affords students the ability to then take more advanced and elective courses in high school that build to their future career aspirations.





Our STEAM program continues to grow, develop, and lead our community and other school districts in providing in depth problem-solving and critical thinking skills to invent, develop, and improve products of student interests. This culminates in our bi-annual STEAM Fair where students are able to present the incredible projects that they created throughout the school year.

Social Growth:

During the 2018-19 school year, our students were leaders within our community by participating in the Southwest Local School District Day of Service.

In addition, our Student Council led our school and partnered with schools from around Southwest Local School District to raise money for The Leukemia and

Lymphoma society. This leadership led to a \$25,000 donation from our schools to help find a cure. Through this program, students met their goal by partnering with their teachers and "Teacher Dares."



Student Leadership:



Harrison Junior School was excited to welcome a new chapter of students into our Honor Society program. This program focuses on student leadership, service, and academics. Harrison Junior School welcomed over 100 students into this program during the 2018-2019 school year.

This past year, Harrison Junior School also participated in its Annual 8th Grade Washington D.C. Trip. Over 170 students visited Gettysburg, the Washington Mall, The Smithsonian Institute, and Mt. Vernon. We look forward to taking even more students each year.



Crosby Elementary School

Academic and Social Growth for ALL students EVERY day is our mission. Here's how we live it.

Academic Growth:

At Crosby Elementary, our teachers work hard to create unique and

challenging learning experiences for our students. For example, as part of a unit on habitats and ecosystems, 5th graders built their own Bat Houses.

First grade students designed and constructed a catapult to launch coins into a cauldron as part of a St. Patrick's Day STEAM project.

Kindergarten students explore Sun Rock Farm to learn about the character traits and adaptive behaviors of living things.

Again this year, Mrs. Margie Brown, Crosby Math teacher, accompanied twenty-five fifth grade students to compete in the Perennial Math

Competition. The Crosby students showed their outstanding problem solving skills by placing second and third in both the team and individual portions of the competition which included several schools from around the Tri-state.



This year, Crosby was awarded the "Overall A Award" by the Ohio Department of Education for its high performance on the State Report Card.





Social Growth:

Our goal is to have 100% of our students participating in a sport, club, or other extra-curricular activity. At Crosby, students can participate in: Skills and Drills Basketball Camp, Basketball Club, Volleyball, Running Club, the Unicycle Team. Crystal Clear Science, Engineering Club, Math Challenge Club, Math Game Club, Math Camp, Starting Artist and Lego Club.

Student Leadership:

Students have the opportunity to demonstrate their leadership skills in many ways. 1st and 2nd grade students are nominated by their teachers to join the Leadership Club and meet monthly to work on service-related projects such as planning the Veteran's Day celebration, helping with the Mayor's Fund Canned Food Drive, participating in the Day of Service, writing rule reminders to post around the school, writing letters to police officers, and sending Valentines to nursing home patients.





Harrison Elementary School

Academic and Social Growth for ALL students EVERY day is our mission. Here's how we live it.

Academic Growth:

Both students and teachers embraced STEAM learning in the classrooms this past school year. Students were provided many hands-on opportunities to stretch their learning and delve deeper into many state standards. Throughout the building, students were observed conducting experiments in our STEAM Lab and inside their classroom. Activities included students' designing their own new school buildings to constructing cup pyramids using only string and cups.

The Ohio Department of Education awarded Harrison Elementary the Overall A Award for 2018. There were only 23 schools in all of Hamilton County to receive this prestigious award.



As an Overall A Award winner, our school's report card shows Harrison Elementary School as demonstrating high academic performance and building bright futures for students of every background and ability level.

Social Growth:

For the 2018-19 school year Harrison Elementary took our District Goal of 100% participation in extra-curricular activities very seriously. Besides many of our usual activities – karate, dance, baton, game clubs, chess club and recycling club we added several more new and exciting opportunities for students. A morning Art club, Orators Club, Music Club and after school Math Club were all introduced and well attended.

The staff at Harrison Elementary believe that it is very important to enrich the minds both academically and socially of each student.

Talks are already taking place for new clubs in the upcoming school year.



Last year our fifth grade students really stepped up and made protecting the environment a high priority. Each Friday, during their lunch/recess time, students went from classroom to classroom picking up recyclables. These students were members of the Harrison Elementary "Green Team". Students at Harrison Elementary are taught from day one in the cafeteria how to recycle their trash and extra lunch items. The Green Team takes this a step further and educated the

students about their day-to-day classroom materials. In order to accommodate all of the fifth grade leaders who wanted to help we changed at the semester.





Miamitown Elementary School

Academic Growth

Miamitown is a National Blue Ribbon School. In 2018, Miamitown received the Momentum Award from the Ohio Department of Education for the third year in a row, and also was named a "High Progress School of Honor." These awards were presented by State Superintendent Paolo DeMaria, who also toured the school and interviewed the students and staff.



Social Growth

Miamitown had a 90% participation rate in school activities. Clubs consisted of the following: Volleyball; Running Club; Basketball; Lego; K'nex Club; Rocket Club; and the Paranormal Investigation Club.

Whitewater Valley Elementary School

Academic Growth:

Whitewater Valley Elementary students made huge strides academically throughout the 2018-19 school year and earned the "Overall A Award" last year from the Ohio Department of Education.

The RTi program at Whitewater Valley Elementary provided small group, intense instruction targeted on student academic gaps. Grade level teachers were supported by academic aides and support personnel to help each student grow. We also added a summer reading program, Grow to Know, for students to continue reading over summer vacation and combat the "Summer Slide". Parents and guardians were invited to curriculum and technology nights to learn first-hand about grade level expectations and how to better support their children at home.



Social Growth:

Whitewater Valley Elementary has a 90% participation rate in extracurricular activities such as Karate Club, Lightning Squad, Jump Rope Club, Girls on the Run, and Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts and Girl Scouts/Brownies.




Fiscal Stewardship


Financial responsibility ensures that the majority of funding is spent on classroom instruction.

Southwest Local School District works diligently to manage District funds in a fiscally responsible manner.

- Spending per pupil: \$10,605.69 (4th lowest in Hamilton County in 2018)
- Percentage spent on instruction: 63.5%; SLSD is ranked 46th out of the 607 districts in the state. This
 puts the district in the top 7% of instructional spending per dollar spent while remaining in the
 bottom 1/3 of total per pupil spending.
- The district out-performed the state average per pupil, spending by over 11%, and the district is within .5% of peer spending.
