#### About Me

This is my 8<sup>th</sup> year teaching (6<sup>th</sup> in SLSD). I have taught everything from 6<sup>th</sup> grade to Pre-Calculus. I have a beautiful wife and three daughters! I like to stay involved in the school community by coaching - I'm one of the head coaches for the Junior School Wrestling Team, and recently stepped down from coaching Tennis in the fall and spring. I am also the Junior Class Co-adviser at the high school and help put on prom. I love learning and like to learn new party/classroom skills (i.e. card tricks, front/back hand springs, solving rubik's cube's, braiding – girl dad -, etc.). In my free time, my wife and I run a home bakery specializing in cinnamon rolls and gourmet cupcakes and I also have a small construction business where I design and build dream spaces for my clients. I very much look forward to teaching your child this upcoming school year!

#### **Open Up Mathematics and Math Accelerator**

We will be using two digital math programs this year, Open Up Math and Math Accelerator for our course of study. Most of our math work will be done using chrome books. Students will be most successful if they have internet access and time on a computer at home to complete assignments. Students can log in on both programs at school and at home. Computers will be available after school for students who do not have internet at home. Students will have the opportunity to stay after school

for help with math homework several days a week. An activity bus will provide transportation home. More information will be provided in the upcoming weeks.

#### **Math Word Problems and Calculator Use**

My students will be learning to solve increasingly complex mathematical word problems this year. It is important that they learn to use a calculator as a problem-solving tool. Students may use calculators to complete math homework problems that involve geometry, fractions, word problems, etc. However, students may not use calculators for skill drills and basic computation. I will let the students know when calculators are allowed. Our state testing (7th grade) has two sections. One section allows calculators and the other does not. I want to make sure students are prepared for both.

#### Homework/Classwork

I believe that homework is necessary for practicing skills that have been learned or for enriching the classroom experience. Students will have math homework most nights.



In order to help students get their homework assignments done, students will be given a Student Planner. They will write their assignments in their planner.

I expect all homework and classwork to be turned in on time. I would like students to complete the practice on the day it is given because it reinforces the learning of the day.

#### **Progress Book**

Parents and students will have access to progress book to check grades in all classes. Students will learn how to log to their account the first few weeks of school and parents will be provided with an access code to log in from home. This is a great way to keep your child on track with his or her grades rather than waiting until a final report card comes home at the end of a quarter.

#### **Cell Phones**

Cell phones are not permitted in class for any reason. Per district policy: cell phones must remain turned off and in student lockers. Violation of this policy will result in the cell phone being confiscated and turned in to the front office where it must be picked up by a parent/guardian.





My name is Mrs. Cathie Carroll and I have been teaching for 28 years.

Throughout my career as an educator, I have taught every grade except 3<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>nd</sup> grades. I have a bachelor's degree from Miami University in Elementary Education K-8 and a master's degree from Wright State University in Computer Technology K-12. I am PLTW certified in Apps Creator, Design and Modeling, Innovators and Makers, Medical Detectives, and Science of Technology. I have been teaching at Southwest Local Schools for 15 years. I am currently employed by Great Oaks Career Campuses as a Satellite Instructor at Harrison Jr. High and teach a wide variety of Project Lead the Way Gateway Courses. (STEAM courses)

What students should know about my classes. PLTW/Gateway classes are very hands-on, engaging, interactive and student driven. Students are encouraged to work corporately to complete projects and reach goals. Attendance is extremely important.

For 8th graders, I teach Apps Creator where students learn to build apps and construct arcade games through block coding.

For 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders, I teach Innovators and Makers where students will learn about programming for the physical world by blending hardware design and software development, allowing students to discover computer science concepts and skills by creating personally relevant, tangible, and shareable projects.

For 7th graders, I teach a combo of Medical Detectives and Science of Technology. In Medical Detectives students play the role of real-life medical detectives as they collect and analyze medical data to diagnose disease. They solve medical mysteries through hands-on projects and labs, measure and interpret vital signs, examine nervous system structure and function, investigate disease outbreaks, and explore how a breakdown within the human body can lead to dysfunction. While in Science of Technology students discover how science impacts the technology of yesterday, today, and the future. In this unit, students apply the concepts of physics, chemistry, and nanotechnology to activities and projects, including making ice cream, cleaning up an oil spill, and discovering the properties of nanomaterials.

#### What Will Language Arts Class Cover?

- Reading Fluency—We will work on reading fluency by having students practice reading aloud passages and participating in reading parts of words to help develop strategies for more confident reading.
- Reading Comprehension—We will learn reading comprehension strategies together as a class. We will practice our skills through comprehension of articles, stories, plays, and full class novels.
- Spelling and Vocabulary—Don't worry no cram and jam lists to study for a weekly quiz.





Dear Students and Parents,

Welcome to 8<sup>th</sup> grade ELA at Harrison Junior School. English Language Arts (ELA) is critical to both the academic and personal growth of young adults. Reading and demonstrating thinking through written and oral communication are an integral part of a successful life. Gaining skill in understanding and sharing language is our number one goal in 8<sup>th</sup> grade ELA.

Every day in class we will be writing, reading, and thinking. Practicing real-world, whole language competency rather than multiple choice quizzes and tests will be our focus throughout the year. We will express our learning through short answer, extended response, and essay writing. Keeping a record of acquired vocabulary and class notes connected to reading, writing, and language elements will also be part of our regular work together. Each student will maintain a portfolio of their classroom writing and a log of daily reading on OneNote (an app on our laptops that I will show students how to use very early in the school year).

Homework in 8<sup>th</sup> grade ELA is to read independently for at least two hours a week and complete comprehension exercises to demonstrate mastery of their independent reading. The rest of our work will be completed in class. If a student is present and uses our time in class efficiently there will be no other homework. If a student is absent, all assignments are posted in OneNote and Teams and can be completed at home. At HJS we work hard, and we play hard! Students who effectively manage their time during class will be encouraged to have fun and read what they would like as our only homework outside of class. We will not be playing computer games, wasting time, or doing any "busy work" during our ELA bell because we have a multitude of tasks to accomplish and skills to acquire before we transition to high school. I am adamant that each of my students be adequately prepared for ninth grade, and I pledge not to waste your child's time in class. We will work diligently!

Maintaining a **reading habit** is critical to the ongoing academic success of students. Reading is a foundational skill for leading a literate life in our society. Here are some reasons why students should become avid readers:

Reading makes you smarter. Reading provides your brain with training. The more you read while the brain is in developmental stages (birth through your early 20s), the smarter you will be as an adult.

**Reading relieves stress**. Teenagers deal with a lot of stress. Reading takes you out of the present and into another place and time; it is a perfect escape.

**Reading builds a mature vocabulary**. Research has shown that the larger your vocabulary bank is upon graduating from high school, the more likely it is you'll be successful. The best way to build a good vocabulary is to read.

**Reading makes you a better writer**. Students who read the most have better fluency, diction and sentence structure in their writing. Having a multitude of mentor texts pass through their hands paired with ample writing practice are the keys to elevated writing skills.

**Reading is sometimes hard, but "hard" is necessary**. After high school, you will be confronted with difficult reading: Cell phone contracts, tax forms, mortgage and tax forms. People who read the most are best equipped to deal with challenging real-world contracts, forms and other readings.

**Reading prepares you for the world of work**. People who leave high school with strong writing skills are more likely to get hired. And once hired, they are often more likely to be promoted.

**Reading well is financially rewarding**. People who read well are more likely to earn higher salaries and are less likely to make financial mistakes.

**Reading arms you against oppression.** James Baldwin said, "It's expensive to be poor." Reading is knowledge; knowledge is power. It's much harder to oppress well-read people.

#### Most importantly,

**Reading is rewarding!** Reading helps us look through the lives of others, takes us to different worlds, and helps us find ourselves.

I am a strong believer in student choice when it comes to reading. The right book makes all the difference to a student who has soured on reading. Therefore, I have collected books into a diverse classroom library collection and borrowed many books from the Cincinnati Library ranging from young adult novels through sports biopics to graphic novels and comic book collections. Research shows that the availability of books is a major motivating factor to get teens to read. Students who read more, read better so we surround them with books each day. If you would prefer that your child not have access to this collection of books, and would rather provide titles of your own choosing for their Independent classroom and homework reading please email me at <a href="mailto:amanda.purdy@southwestschools.org">amanda.purdy@southwestschools.org</a>

I understand that each family has different views of what is appropriate and what is not. None of the books in my classroom library or Cincinnati Library collection are assigned. Students select books from our collection on a voluntary basis. Recurring homework and in class assignments only require students to have **something to read** with them in class and at home: you and your child decide what that something to read will be. As parents we ask you to remain aware throughout the year of the books your child has chosen to read. Working together I hope we can encourage students to read and catapult their literacy and learning this year.

The level and amount of Spanish will vary according to class, but EVERY student must participate in class. We are here to learn; please do not be afraid to try to speak in class. Lack and/or refusal to participate will be reflected in the grade of the student. Students will earn a participation point every day for their participation and engagement in class.

#### Vocabulary/Studying:

The foundation of learning a language is knowing the words. Study a little bit every day. Learn 5-6 words a night, including how to pronounce and spell them (accent marks, too!) If you know your vocabulary well, you will find that the rest of learning a language will come much more easily!

### Homework/Assignments:

- <u>Most</u> homework will be online, either on the textbook website www.vhlcentral.com, or on www.quia.com.
- *Usually* assigned Monday, due Thursday night at midnight.
- Homework online is due by MIDNIGHT the day it is due (NOT at the start of class.)
- All late work earns a 50% reduction in score.
- Students are responsible for turning the scores of all late work (including grace passes). There is a form on Microsoft Teams to do this.


