MY CLASSES:

Welcome to our exciting and dynamic STEAM class! This class is built around project-based learning with a focus on student agency, creativity, and hands-on exploration. Our curriculum is designed to help students develop essential skills in critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and communication while navigating real-world challenges.

Students will engage in a variety of thematic units, such as Digital Citizenship, Coding, Engineering, Space, and Minecraft Engineering, each with unique projects designed to spark curiosity and innovation. Whether they are designing a light-up greeting card, building a cardboard arcade game, coding a custom maze game, or reimagining a learning space in Minecraft, students will be encouraged to think outside the box and apply the Engineering Design Process to their creations. While 7th and 8th grade students will take these skills to the next level and learn to apply coding and the machines in the makerspace to their projects.

Our projects will be a mix of individual and partner work, allowing students to develop both independence and collaboration skills.
